This course will look at the literature of human rights, -- both legal texts that shape formal conceptions of rights and literary texts (classic and contemporary, fiction and non-fiction) that elucidate situations in which rights are at issue. Addressing the various critiques of legal accounts of "human rights," the course explores how literature (broadly construed) grants us a deeper understanding of what we might mean by such concepts as "freedom of expression," "due process," "torture," and "genocide."
